Do you have experience working with gifted individuals? Do you typically work with children, teens, adults, and/or families?

Yes! We work with gifted individuals, especially those that are 2E. We typically work with students age 7 to 21. Giftedness tends to hide dyslexia very well, with parents not realizing that their child is not equipped to read and write at the highest of levels until they are in high school. We have met a handful of students that came in for academic support for advanced classes, to discover that the reason they were for the first time beginning to not "keep up", was they had dyslexia.

Do you have a specialty or preferred area of expertise? Do you have additional certifications or training that may be of interest to families with gifted children?

Our team serves a wide range of abilities. Company founder and lead tutor, Morgan, particularly works with dyslexic students, including those that are gifted and/or have ADHD. Her team sees gifted and 2e students as well.

Morgan holds a BA in English with ELA Teaching Endorsement from UW Seattle, has completed the Wilson Reading System Introductory Course, and is in-progress of completing Wilson Reading System Certification through Drexel University. Upon completion in Fall 2025, she will begin her Master's Degree. Morgan also completes regular continuing education courses, including those presented by ReadWA, the Yale Center for Dyslexia and Creativity, and Wilson Language Training.

All other tutors at Juniper Street Tutoring are in college at a minimum, and most have advanced degrees.

Have you worked with twice-exceptional children/teens and their families?

Yes! We work regularly with Hi-Cap and gifted students, most of which are also a combination of being on the spectrum, have ADHD, dyslexia, mental-health disorders, and other unique qualities that make them twice-exceptional.

Briefly state how your understanding of the needs of gifted/2e individuals and families inform your approach?

We understand that there is absolutely no one-size-fits-all. The qualities that combine to create every person, every student, are unique to them and their story. We recognize that, typically, the number one priority for families with gifted/2e students is for their child to feel understood and never placed into a single box. As a result, we strive to help our student's build their confidence, advocate for themselves in a healthy way, recognize their strengths and weaknesses, and grow academically. The qualities and ways in which students are gifted is also varied, so we take the time to get to know what THEY need to thrive and pair you with the tutor that will not only meet their needs academically, but also personally.

Additionally, we also know how often parents want to be able to help their child grow but feel they can't reach them. We are here to help parents support their student's academics in whatever way makes them most comfortable. If as a parent you never want to be in charge of academics and leave that to teachers, that is fine! We will provide your student with independent homework that doesn't require you to "go back to school". If you would like to be highly involved, learning the way we teach so that you can also teach them at home, learning the full Wilson Reading System and all the rules of language, we invite you to sit in and work with us outside of sessions so that you can support them directly at home with interactive homework.
